This two-day workshop explores what 'the common good' means

- biblically
- theologically
- in a society with severe divisions
- in practice in our cities, towns and villages

This two-day event enables Christian leaders to retreat and reflect. It gives opportunity to address: how can we enhance ministry in our localities at a time of polarisation and social fragmentation?

The workshop aims to build the capacity of church leaders and congregations to strengthen civil society and to bring the common good alive where we are.


It is designed for people in church leadership, ordained or lay, across the Christian denominations and traditions – e.g. priests, pastors, vicars, lay leaders, chaplains. From whatever Christian background and context you come, you will be welcome.

Developed by Together for the Common Good, the workshop aims to refresh ministry and mission by 'common good thinking and practice'.

In more detail, the workshop will look at:

- the Christian vision of the common good
- causes of social division and how the practice of the common good acts as an antidote to the culture of individualism
- 'common good principles' and how to apply them in practice
- how our churches can be, not just for the poor, but of the poor
- how a theology of relationship and the common good can refresh mission
- how understanding the 'vocational responsibilities' of the local church alongside other bodies in the community can:
 - ▶ foster local leadership
 - ▶ build social trust
 - ▶ strengthen civil society
