Welcome to our 2025 impact report. It's a privilege to share this with you. I want to thank you — whether you are a donor, friend, sponsor, partner, subscriber, volunteer, supporter or participant — Together for the Common Good is what it is today because of you.

A new, volatile era

The UK is in the midst of a deep crisis. Trust in the state is collapsing, people are angry and the country is fragmented.

Our work aims to help people across the churches respond. In the words of one admirer, our work is "a Spirit-led response to the fractures in our current social order."

The renewal of our moral, social, cultural and economic life requires decisive action, but not only in terms of political economy.

The new era is more religious, and more in need of the wisdom and love that Christians can offer.

The response of the Church

The Church needs to be the leading moral force for the restoration of our nation. But – and this is a leftover of the liberal era – much of the Christian family has suffered a loss of confidence.

Churches can too easily fall into mission-drift, whether by internalising the dominant secular culture, or by being misled by the progressive left or the nationalist right. The prayer of St John Paul II seems powerfully resonant today: "Lord, Restore Your Church on Earth With the Gifts of Penance and Reconciliation."

This is a time to turn back to God and neighbour, to bear witness to a generous and capacious national story of solidarity, grounded in Christian anthropology, that balances rights with responsibilities.

The antidote to division is as much spiritual as it is social and political. The need now is for an outward-facing, Christ-centred, relational spirituality to restore the bonds of family and community life.

A better story

We offer the Common Good to shape that story – an inclusive, ethical vision full of energy and hope, capable of inspiring action across all levels of society. Rooted in the Catholic Social Thought tradition, our work helps leaders, churches, schools and charities to play their part.

Growth

2025 has been a dynamic year. 4,200 young people from 30 schools engaged in our Common Good Schools programme and 31 teachers were trained.

We published 24 episodes of our *Leaving Egypt* podcast which were downloaded 33,000 times, a 101% increase on last year.

We held seven events. More than 925 leaders attended our talks and gatherings. Overall, we engaged at least 3,630 people in person, and countless more indirectly. Our 2,943 subscribers received seven editions of the T4CG Newsletter and 43 new online resources.

I want to thank Plough Quarterly, Caritas Westminster, Church Urban Fund, CARE and the Catholic Union for partnering with us on events – and especially CCLA for underwriting the hospitality which is so vital for building relationships.



I'm truly honoured to lead this mission. It is remarkable what our dedicated team has achieved with such limited resources. My sincere hope is that this report will move you to stand with us as we help churches, schools and charities respond in these testing times.

The **Common Good Schools** programme trains teachers to help young people take responsibility and build local relationships in school and neighbourhood. Delivered through classroom-based learning and community-based experience, the resource works in any school.

Rooted in Catholic Social Teaching principles, it enhances Catholic Life and Mission, meets CSI and SIAMS inspection requirements, and contributes to the Christian Distinctiveness of a school.

Connecting Laders

Our relationships across the Christian traditions allow us to convene and facilitate unique in-person gatherings for leaders.

T4CG events enable guests to focus on the big issues of our time through the lens of Catholic social thought.

A group of 60-70 leaders is invited, 30 of whom also attend a roundtable dinner. Events centre around an expert speaker whose lecture is released as a podcast.

We intentionally assemble a good mix, across doctrine, sector and opinion, from charities, churches, and para-church bodies in key diocesan, academic, educational, media, policy and political roles.

This year we launched our Staying Human series with four lectures. Our speakers were Luke Bretherton on Reimagining the Spirit of the Commons, Lord Maurice Glasman and Jon Cruddas on Statecraft for the Common Good, Susannah Black Roberts on Being a Person in the Age of AI, and Dan Hitchens on Useful Lives.

In addition, as part of our ongoing effort to address mission drift in Christian social action, we convened an *Advent Retreat* for 36 senior charity leaders to discern ways forward, and published a report.

Inspiring the local church

This year we celebrated year two of our *Leaving Egypt* podcast, the fruit of a transatlantic partnership between **Jenny Sinclair** in the UK, and **Alan Roxburgh** in Canada. Our fortnightly episodes explore what it means to be God's people in a time of unravelling.

Alan and Jenny welcome both well-known and everyday guests from across the Christian traditions. Together, they do two things: interpret the signs of the times with leading thinkers, and listen to stories of hope from Christians who sense the Holy Spirit calling them into the reweaving of life in their local communities.

How you can help - now

Demand for this work is increasing. We are ambitious to grow – but to continue, we a need a secure financial base. T4CG has been operating on a shoestring budget: around £90K per year pays for all our work – all costs including the salaries of our small team of four (1.9 FTE).

Our team achieves far more than would be expected of such a small charity. This is because we work very hard, always in partnership, our many associates give their time pro bono, and we often secure sponsorship for our events. We work virtually so there are no office costs.

Our small band of loyal donors are the lifeline of this mission, but without significantly increasing the number of supporters, we cannot sustain this work. We urgently need more people to join this vital community to help us serve churches, schools and charities in these testing times.

We must raise a minimum of £60K to secure this work for next year.
